

A Letter from Father Marcin

Dear Parish Family,

This past week we remembered two saints that were founders of two religious orders. The first Saint that we celebrated on July 31st is St. Ignatius of Loyola. He was the founder of the Society of Jesus or in short Jesuits. However, before he found the new religious order, Ignatius was a soldier who fought many battles. During one of the battles, he was wounded in the leg, and he was no longer able to continue his service. Ignatius had to spend a long time in bed waiting for his wounds to heal. You can imagine the boredom that he experienced waiting for his leg to heal. He tried to read books, however the place in which he stayed did not have any worldly books about some epic stories, but instead books on the lives of the saints. While reading those books Ignatius noticed that his heart was inflamed with the desire and longing to live like those saints. He felt a great peace in his heart contemplating these lofty ideals and heroic lives of the saints. He also would spend some time thinking about worldly life and he would recall some of those epic novels that he read in the past about knights, battles, and romantic encounters. However, the joy or satisfaction that he got from thinking about worldly life would not last long and he noticed that it caused him a feeling of anxiety and dryness. After a while Ignatius realized those differences that he experienced. He came up with a method of discernment using the knowledge from his own experiences to figure out whether he was following the spirit of God or the evil spirit. If he followed the spirit of God, then he would experience a profound and lasting peace and joy. However, if he would follow the evil spirit, who would try to keep him away from doing the will of God and to deceive him by leading him back to the worldly life and bodily passions, he would not have had this lasting peace and joy in his heart.

Ignatius method of discernment of spirits was quite innovative for his time, since using of feelings to discern spiritual life was not used. The feelings that can change so quickly and be affected by so many different stimulants of the bodily senses were not thought to be reliable for spiritual progress. The spiritual masters warned about the feelings as a way that the evil spirits or demons can use to influence our thinking, our decision making and our discernment about our relationship with God. Although, feelings by themselves were not considered bad, yet they were considered unreliable and discernment by use of reason and logic and truth as more certain for this purpose. Ignatius provided spiritual exercises as an aid to use his method of discernment of spirits in order that one may acquire greater certainty. To check that one was making a correct conclusion in the discernment, his method also involved the use of spiritual director for the purpose of greater objectivity and clarity. Today Ignatius' spiritual exercised and discernment of spirits are well known means by which Catholics can better discern whether they are truly growing spiritually and whether they are truly being led by the Spirit of God. Since Ignatius spirituality involves a method, therefore it means that one needs to learn the method in order that he may achieve the spiritual benefit from it.

The second Saint that we celebrated this week on first of August was St. Alphonsus Liguori, the founder of Redemptorists. This saint did not come up with any new spiritual method instead he was involved in teaching moral theology and was excellent in his explanation of application of moral law, natural law, law of God in Christian life. Every Christian that seeks to have a good relationship with God and to make a good progress in spiritual life needs to be aware of the truths of morality and its principles. A good moral life is the beginning of true spiritual progress and a necessary foundation, without which no spiritual progress will be possible. Moral life trains us in virtues and in upholding God's commandments. Good moral life is a just life. Jesus in his teaching many times addressed various moral issues because living justly reflects that we are using our will and intellect with the purpose that God has given them to us. Christian morality is much more demanding, and it requires greater effort, commitment, and sacrificial love. This higher level of morality flows from the necessity to live a new life of grace and from our participation in the life of Holy Trinity. Our Christian participation in the life of God calls us to a greater perfection of life. The perfection that we seek is achievable due to the gift of divine grace while without grace it is not. Since Christians are true children of God it demands of them to live as a visible reflection of God. The Christians must be different from the rest of the world because their relation to the world have changed once they became adopted children of God. The Christian must live in the world, but not be of the world. The Christian must be of God because he belongs to God and not to the world. When Christian does not seek to live a good moral life, then he betrays his relationship with God who bestowed on him such a great honor and dignity as a child of God. Living a good moral life for a Christian is always focused on giving glory to God and desire to love God more.

We are grateful to God that he blessed us with these great men of faith, and through them as his instruments have helped us to live faithfully our Catholic Faith. May the benefits of their wisdom that they share with us help us to advance in our own spiritual life and bring us evermore closer to our salvation and the life of heaven.

Why is it so important to register with a parish? Registration is the official way we join a parish community. Some people think they automatically are registered just by attending Mass regularly in a particular parish but it requires a form to be submitted to the parish office with copies of sacrament records. Registration is a commitment to a community, a way to be included in the religious, social and ministerial activities of your parish. Registration is also necessary for certain benefits and administrative purposes such as, scheduling sacraments, obtaining a sponsor or godparent eligibility form if requirements are met, a qualification letter from the pastor and receiving a year end donation tax statement. Weekly collection envelopes are used to track attendance at Mass. Registration in your parish is a statement of faith and confidence in the life and work of your parish. The Sacrament of Marriage

Holy Matrimony is the covenant a man and woman make to one another and to God to work as partners for the rest of their lives. Eucharistic Revival 2024!

Indianapolis , Indiana: July 17—July 21, 2024: Known for the Indy 500, Indianapolis Colts, the NCAA , Indianapolis transformed into the largest Eucharistic Congress in 83 years! Taking place in downtown Indianapolis at the city's convention center and Lucas Oil Stadium—which only a few weeks before had been converted into a natatorium for the U.S. Olympic Team swim trials—the Congress had upward of 55,000 attendees.



The Filippini sisters were also represented at the Revival. Four of our sisters caught up with Brother Dominic who was taught by our sisters over 30 years ago. This too, is part of the miracle of the Congress. Midst thousands of people connections were made. He told the sisters that his Filippini education has sustained him through his life.

The mile long Eucharistic procession through the streets was accompanied by over 60,000 participants singing hymns and praising God, Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity. The sisters and all who attended were so impressed that when the Eucharistic procession entered the stadium, all were silent and spent much time in adoration.







Perhaps one of the most poignant moments during the Revival came when Cardinal Luis Tagle of the Philippines shared a story of going to a refugee camp in Lebanon. A girl there commented on the strangeness of his visit from her perspective, as there were no Christians in the camp: "Why did you come here if there are no Christians?" The cardinal said he then told her, "My friend and mentor Jesus tells us that we should love everyone." The girl then tugged on the cardinal's garment and replied, "I want to meet your friend Jesus."

Consider this: The lesson of the Revival is simple. We too, are called to our own personal revival, our love of Jesus in the Eucharist. We are called bring His Love to a world, to another person who so desperately need's Christ's love. God bless you.
