A Letter from Father Marcín

Dear Parish Family,

Last Sunday I shared with you about Our Lady of Guadalupe and the image that she left of herself on Juan Diego apron. On this third Sunday of Advent as we rejoice in the approaching celebration of Christ's birth, I want to share with you more about the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe. The original image remains in the shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe, in Mexico City. This image is a living miracle, and the following details will help you understand why it is so. The first fact about this image we need to consider is the fabric that the image of our Blessed Mother is imprinted on. The material that the apron was made from was cacti, which is a very rough fabric, and it remains intact mostly up to 15 years. Secondly, after examining the samples of the fibers from the image they found no trace of paint on them. This type of fabric does not allow the paint to stick to it well. The investigators of the image have created painted copies of the image of our Blessed Mother on this type of material and they allowed them to hang in the chapel where the original image was kept. After only 2 years of being exposed to the environment of the chapel, the copies began quickly to deteriorate from excessive moisture and insects, while the original image continues to be in perfect condition even though nearly 500 years have passed. The image of Our Lady of Guadalupe portrays Mary as an Aztecan princess, whose dress is covered in flowers that indicate the presence of God. She has a sash tied around her waist indicating that she is pregnant. Mary's figure is veiled with an outer shawl covered with golden stars. The location of those stars is a precise reflection of the constellation of the stars in the skies that could have been observed over Mexico City on December 12th, 1531. The only difference is that those stars are reflection of the stars in the sky as if one looked down from the sky and not look up to the sky. The color of the shawl is green for earth. Mary's hair loosely coming down indicated to Azteca people that she is a virgin maiden. Golden rays of the sun surround Mary. The Azteca people worshiped the god of the sun. Mary's hands have two shades, one darker and one brighter, that represent two races that live in those lands. Over the womb of Mary there is a Jasmine flower which for Azteca people is a sign of divine and the center of the cosmic order. Mary stands over the crescent moon as woman from the Book of Revelation, while for the Azteca people it showed that she stands and crushes with her feet their serpent moon god. Much of the symbolism was coded to Mary's image that can only amaze us how Our Blessed Mother spoke to the natives of Mexico to bring them to Christ and to the one true faith. In the most recent history, due to scientific advances a new discovery in the image was made that was not yet known. While examining the image under the electronic microscope, to the investigators surprise, they found that the eyes of Our Blessed Mother contain an image of those individuals who were present in the room when the image originally appeared on the tilma. However, the image in Mary's eye is upside down indicating the lens of the Mary's eye behaves like a living eye. During open persecution of Catholic Church in 1920's in Mexico, the freemasons and the communists sought to destroy the image of Our Blessed Mother. While people were gathered inside the chapel to pray and venerate the image a member of freemasons brought a bomb hidden inside the flower basket. He placed it on the chapel main altar above which behind regular glass was displayed the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe. The chapel was packed with people, so it was not easy for him to leave quickly. While he was still leaving the chapel the bomb exploded. The blast from the explosion pushed people away and made them collapse, especially those closest to the blast. The stained-glass windows blew up and even the windows of the homes nearby shattered as well. The giant altar-cross that stood on the altar was bent and much of the structure of the altar was damaged. However, to everyone's surprise, the glass that covered the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe did not suffer even a scratch. The man responsible for bringing the bomb was known to the people, but they let him go, because with their own eyes they witnessed that our Blessed Mother would not allow her image to be destroyed. I hope that these amazing facts about the image of Our Lady of Guadalupe will help you to grow in devotion to our Blessed Mother, I know it helped me and because of this miracles image I am being constantly reminded that our Heavenly Mother is with us, and we can count on her unfailing protection and support. Our Lady of Guadalupe, Pray for us!
