A Message from Father Euk

The Book of Wisdom is a Deutero Canonical book of the Bible. It was rejected by the Jews in 87 AD because it was not written in Hebrew, but rather in Greek. After the Reformation some of the Protestants chose to also reject it. My impression is that these texts were meant to save Judaism within the diaspora which spread into the Greek speaking districts because the children preferred to learn Greek instead of Hebrew for commercial purposes. This particular reading is about the mercy of God. God is the Creator and Master of all. He has absolute power over all and punishes evil out of righteous indignation. Yet the exercise of this power is very controlled, deliberate and merciful. God's mercy allows us to repent of our sins with the assurance of forgiveness if it is done through the Church either by Baptism, Reconciliation or the Sacrament of the Sick.

In the Gospel Jesus speaks again in parables. These are earthy stories that reveal divine mysteries to the humble and not to the arrogant. These stories prevent the proud from understanding the deeper meaning because of their closed mindedness.

In the first parable, Jesus is the sower of the good seed in the field of the world. The weeds are probably from the darnel plant, which is a poisonous plant that looks like wheat when sprouting. The intention of the devil is to ruin the crop or to poison the consumer. In pulling the weeds up both the good and the bad will be lost because it is so hard to tell the difference. The harvesters are the angels of judgment sent by God. The field is the Church where the good and the wicked exist side by side and grow together. St. Augustine tells us, "The wicked exist in this world either to be converted or through them the good may exercise patience." We are all on a faith journey and some of us take more time to repent. In the meantime the Church simply preaches repentance and practices patience. In His own good time, God will settle accounts, but we must be like God and desire that all be saved.

The parable of the mustard seed describes the Church. The Church starts small around the world, but it eventually grows big. As the plant grows, it opens itself to accommodate all kinds of birds. The birds that come to live in the tree symbolize nations. God will give shelter to all who choose to ask for it and obey Him. Those who refuse to repent and reconcile themselves will not stay long by their own free will.

The last parable speaks of the mysterious rising of yeast in bread. This is symbolic of Sacraments that give sanctifying grace, the life of the Holy Spirit. Jesus gathers around sinners like yeast. Very little yeast is needed to make a very large amount of flour rise. This symbolizes the vast success of the kingdom because Jesus in His mercy is so merciful to sinners who repent of their sins.

Let us pray for a respectful attitude toward sinners in our midst and that we not be contaminated by them, but through our patience and prayer they may be converted. Let us pray that our sinfulness does not contaminate others. Hopefully, we will eventually shed our sinfulness in our journey through life so that we will swiftly enter the sinless world of Heaven.

Dear Parents and Guardians:

The beauty of the summer season is ours to be enjoyed. The bright sunshine, the cleansing rain, and the longer daylight hours afford time for personal renewal and time to enjoy the boundless energy of carefree children.

Department of Catholic Education

While the school year effectively came to a close in June, our principals, teachers, and staff have not experienced a defined "summer break" as planning unfolds with new regulations for the 2020-2021 school year.

An essential priority in the re-opening and return to brick and mortar school facilities is the health and safety of students, faculty and staff. Our schools have formed task forces and are utilizing a number of resources to create a detailed plan to re-open school buildings. Resources that contribute to the planning include guidance from Governor Murphy's office, the CDC, the NJ Commissioner of Education, the American Academy of Pediatrics and the document from Loyola University, "Leading with Hope."

As you can imagine, there is much detail, reflection, consideration, and unanticipated expense as health and safety aspects provide the focus for continued learning and growth for all students. Flexibility continues to be the mantra in creating this plan as changes are often revealed from key agencies on a day-by-day basis. With new information and guidance available, changes to the plan are anticipated. School officials are assessing the school's readiness regarding technology and upgrades to school infrastructure as well as the need for additional devices and materials. Faculty members are engaged in continuous learning and professional development during the summer months. The goal is to deliver instruction to meet the needs of students whether in the traditional classroom setting or in a virtual reality should the effects of COVID-19 become more widespread and virulent.

Spirits remain high. Our administrators, faculty and staff are committed to provide an exceptional Catholic education for all students. They are committed and dedicated individuals and know the benefits of hard work to provide the best educational environment for your child(ren).

The return to school plan is expected to be available to you in the beginning weeks of August. Again, flexibility continues to be underscored as updates to the plan may be necessitated by ongoing guidance.

As you may be aware, I will retire on July 31, 2020. The incoming superintendent, Dr. Vincent DePaul Schmidt, looks forward to guiding our Catholic school communities into the future. Dr. Schmidt has served as the associate superintendent in the Archdiocese of Detroit, the Superintendent in the Diocese of Wheeling-Charleston, West Virginia and most recently as an adjunct professor at Loyola Marymount University located in Los Angeles. I know you will provide a warm welcome and cooperative spirit to Dr. Schmidt as he comes to know the blessings that await discovery in the Diocese of Trenton.

It has been a pleasure to serve as Superintendent of Catholic Schools for eleven years and an honor to serve our Catholic schools on behalf of Bishop David O'Connell, C.M. I have been blessed to work with talented administrators and educators who provide leadership in our diocese. It was a delight to visit our Catholic schools on numerous occasions and observe the creativity and the talents of the students. They have been challenged to think deeply, to assess various perspectives, and to be guided by the tenets of our faith as they live lives based on integrity. I am proud that they will be our leaders in future years.
