A Letter from Father Marcin

Dear Parish Family,

The month of November is coming to an end and this Sunday ends yet another liturgical year during which we celebrated the mysteries of our Faith. I wish to continue to speak about the Last Things. This week I want to address the death or the end of this life. We are born into this world with joy of our families and friends, but when this life is coming to an end, we experience sorrow. Many have asked why this must be, why the Lord permits us to go through this pain of saying goodbye to our loved ones. We must remember that death was not part of God's original plan for humanity or at least not in the same way. God, who is life, takes no pleasure in our experience of death. Death is an act of mercy and justice. When God created Adam and Eve, he intended for them to live but through sin death entered the world. Death became our punishment for original sin and that is why we who have descended from Adam and Eve and inherited their sin must die. Thy is why death is an act of God's justice for our evil. Death is also an act of mercy. Because God did not desire for us to live forever in misery of this life and so death brings the end to that misery and offers us relief from this life sufferings. It is thanks to God's revelation that we are aware of the significance and meaning of death. Without knowing God's plan, death is meaningless and cruel. For us Catholics death is part of our normal life of faith. When we are born, our parents bring us to be Baptized where we die to sin and old self and rise to new life of grace. Every day of our Christian life we seek to die to ourselves to live more freely for God. At every Mass we witness the death of Christ, that act of love which brought sin and death to death. Everyday we are reminded of our own approaching death when we pray for our Blessed Mother intercession: "pray for us sinners now and at the hour of our death." Every day and especially during the month of November we pray for the faithful departed. So, death for us Catholics has a meaning because we see it as an instrument and a mean that leads us to life and immortality. We as Catholics should contemplate theses truths regularly so that we may look at this life through the prism of faith. Also, contemplating our final end can help us to grow in wisdom and see this life more and more through God's eyes. Death should not be feared, but it should be welcomed when it comes, because it brings us to eternal life. Death brings our hope of being with God to realization. All those Saints in heaven have passed through the death like through the gate and they are now enjoying the fullness of life, peace, and happiness. That is why the greater desire we have for heaven and our loving union with God, the more death loses its grip of fear on us. We do not seek death to remain dead, but rather that we may become truly alive. That is why, especially during the month of November, we are encouraged to visit cemeteries where our loved ones have been placed to rest. For us Catholics cemeteries are not a place of death, but a place of hopeful waiting for our resurrection. The cemeteries remind us of the shortness of this earthly life and its end, so that we may not waste time, but continue our preparation for eternal life that awaits us. It is therefore a good catholic practice to go to cemeteries to visit and pray. We should clean the place of our loved us resting place to remind ourselves that their remains are sacred and that they have us who remain to take care of that which they cannot do for themselves. When we are there, we also light the candles, which is an act of faith in resurrection of the dead, but also an act of faith in Christ who first rose from the dead. The burning light of the candle reminds us that our loved ones are alive even though their bodies are not. We affirm our faith that we are more than a body and that we also possess an immortal soul. As I grew up in Poland on All Saints Day and All Souls Day, I would travel with my family from one cemetery to another to try to visit as many sites as possible of those deceased that were from my family or known to us. During the evening, cemeteries were lit with thousands of candles as if they were on fire and the glow would be so bright that one would not need light from streetlamps. It is my hope that the visiting of cemetery would also become a family event for every Catholic so that it may help us grow in deeper faith and keep the hope of resurrection and heavenly life more vivid in our minds and hearts.
